We are filled with gratitude and inspiration, from the stories heard throughout the year.



### Partnering Local Makes Things Happen

“When the pandemic began, Nelson’s Golden Years in DuBois, did not have masks, struggled to get gloves and had to buy safety shields from a local hardware store, said Jackie Syktich, Owner and Administrator, Nelson’s Golden Years.”



I filled out surveys through the state department of health to apply to get the vaccine. Thanksgiving and Christmas came and went with no supply sent. I was then connected with the Regional Response Healthcare Collaborative Program, created to help long term care facilities, and **“By the grace of God, we were matched with Penn Highlands DuBois. Their staff was here helping us the very next week.”**

We were taught hand washing protocol, and proper masking and gowning procedures for staff. Penn Highlands DuBois helped us order hand sanitizer and PPE. We learned quarantine procedures and how to create red zones for infected residents. At the end of January, Penn Highlands DuBois came through for us once again. We received vaccines for 75 residents and staff. “Everyone was thrilled!”

“I will forever shout praise and tell everyone I know, what Penn Highlands DuBois did for us when we had nowhere to turn. The staff came through for us for so many things, you have no idea. It goes to show, partnering local makes things happen!”

## Vaccinate Educators and Community Members

Education staff throughout the Huntingdon region expressed the immediate desire to get the COVID vaccine once available. School administrators at the Juniata Valley School District, stepped up to offer space in the high school cafeteria to host clinics for the community. Nearly 3,100 shots were administered, during the 4 clinics that were held, according to pharmacy records at Penn Highlands Huntingdon. **"I can't tell you how many folks came to me afterward, to tell me how much they appreciated, having Penn Highlands Huntingdon come here and offer the vaccine.** They worked with us on anything we needed to do. "In winter 2020, the people in our region were thrilled to learn that our community hospital, Mon Valley, was the first hospital in Washington County and one of only two health systems in Southwestern Pennsylvania to receive the COVID vaccine. Our delight was quickly diminished when we heard that the hospital's waiting list for public vaccinations topped 30,000 people and feared we would have a long wait. Our fears were unfounded because the hospital brought the vaccine to us." said Holley-Holmes.

The hospital set up clinics at local fire halls, social halls, high schools and food banks to administer the first doses. One elderly gentleman in our church cares for his disabled son, and did not have transportation to a clinic site, so hospital staff members took the vaccine to his home. **The people of this region are very fortunate to have Penn Highlands Mon Valley providing their health and wellness. They are a blessing to this community.**
